Replacing Nouns

Subject Pronouns

Performing Actions

Subject pronouns act as the subject of a verb, performing the action in a sentence.

Examples

I, you, he, she, it, we, they are all examples of subject pronouns.

Object Pronouns



Receiving Actions

Object pronouns are the recipients of the action in a sentence. They are used after verbs or prepositions.




Examples





Case Errors
